
EUROPEAN PROJECT

Homeless for the Holidays

Every Saturday evening, Jillian Reilly-Hickey, along with her daughter Aishling Hickey of Ballyfermot Youthreach give up their free time to help the homeless. Rain or shine, they travel into Dublin City Centre loaded up with hot food and hot drinks donated via Jillian's Facebook page, Helping the Less Fortunate. Inspired by their generosity, and moved by the tragic tales about homelessness that have dominated the news recently, students and staff at Ballyfermot Youthreach decided they wanted to do something for Christmas to help out in some small way.

A 'Fun Day' was organised to raise money to put together Christmas gift bags for the homeless. Each pack included hats, gloves, socks, toiletries and a Christmas treat to eat. Students also wrote Christmas cards for the homeless that they themselves had designed. In total over a hundred gift packs were assembled and on a cold, wet Saturday, 20th December, students Aishling Hickey, Ann Marie Farrell, Ciara Roche and Michelle Harte, along with teacher Lily Heller and Mairead D'Arcy from Blanchardstown I.T., joined Jillian and her crew on Capel Street Bridge. Braving the bitter cold and dressed in Santa hats and high visible vests, they hit the streets! Covering both North and Southside of the city, food and hot drinks were served as packs and Christmas cards were distributed to over 100 homeless people that night. The reactions were amazing. One homeless person brought tears to a student's eyes when she said, "this is the only card I will get this Christmas. I feel so special and blessed. I cannot thank you enough." Homelessness is a complex issue. If you are at risk of becoming homeless or are sleeping rough, please talk to someone. According to the Dublin Regional Homeless Executive, people can become homeless for a variety of reasons: family breakdown, social exclusion, mental health problems, drug or alcohol misuse, difficulties with sexual orientation and poor physical health. Structural reasons can also lead to homelessness due to low income, rent or mortgage payments, debt and unemployment. Focus Ireland reckon there are up to 5,000 people homeless in Ireland at any one given time. Peter Mc Verry believes that people sleeping rough on the street only represent 2% of this overall figure. Behind these figures lie real people. People no dif-

This was all made possible by Jillian, her crew, the Youthreach students and a kind, generous woman in Lidl Ballyfermot who, seeing students buying toiletries in bulk asked what they were for. When told, she reached into her purse, took out forty euro and donated it to the appeal. "The world is full of nice people. If you can't find one, be one" (Nishan Panwar). Sometimes you will find the nicest people huddled in a cold doorway.

Suzanne explained to the group "our students have a visual impairment, or no vision and they need sensory and visual signs to help them get to different areas around the campus. The signs need to be big, bright and tactile to cater for all students". Blanchardstown Youthreach students are now in the planning stages of developing appropriate signs and also helping to transform the garden areas. We will keep you updated with their progress

Galway Student Visits Jigsaw



Wednesdays in our Youthreach is an activity day. This Wednesday 12th November 2014, we were told to meet at 10 in the morning at Jigsaw, we were here to learn about what they do for young people. Jigsaw is a drop in centre for young people from the ages of 15 to 25. They help young people in many ways. Jigsaw is here so that if you need to have a chat about anything that's bothering you, you can either drop in to the building or you can make an appointment: either way is ok. When you come to Jigsaw they bring you into one of their private consultation rooms, which have colourful couches and they give

you a cup of tea. It is very much a relaxed atmosphere. The lady at Jigsaw was giving us some information on mental health. She told us that a scary 1 in 3 young people have experienced mental health distress, but this can be easily helped by just having a talk with someone. Sometimes it's just a case of keeping everything bottled up and then just feeling alone, most of the time once you let it all out its ok then. In other cases, if you do need help to decide what to do or to make a new plan for your life that's ok too, and that's what jigsaw are here to help you with. Everything in Jigsaw is completely confidential, unless you're putting yourself or someone else at risk of danger. The lady at Jigsaw told us that many people think that it's mainly girls who go there but this is false. They have a fifty:fifty boys to girl ratio. If you don't want to drop into the building you can also text call or email. So the pressures off of you. Oh and it's free.

More Funding And Resources Are Needed To Tackle Heroin Use In Cork

There has been a significant rise in the number of heroin users in the last five years with approximately 500 heroin users in Cork now and this is contributing to homelessness, crime and death.

Crimes in Cork were up by about 40% by July and September 2014 compared with the previous year and it has been linked to increase of drug use in the city.

There are users shooting up in public places and throwing away needles carelessly where there are children at play. It doesn't matter if you are rich or poor, black or white or what community you are from — if you take heroin you can become addicted fast and end up either homeless, dead or in prison. We need to do something about this. We need to stop heroin becoming a bigger problem in Cork and taking over communities like it has in Dublin.

We need to make sure there is enough funding and resources to contain the problem. I am a student living on the northside of Cork and I don't want to see people shooting up or have children grow up in a city where they are surrounded by the worst kind of drugs.

A New Recruit To Cabra Youthreach

When there's a bad atmosphere in the class we just get Cora and she gives us a good atmosphere she's funny and very playful.

Cora comes to our Youthreach because she is an assist dog for one of the teachers with epilepsy. She is being trained as a service and seizure dog. This means that when and if Oísin, Cora's owner, has a seizure Cora will find someone to help him to wake up. She can also get Oísin's phone or medication and stay with him through the seizure. If we had not got Cora in our Youthreach we would really miss her because we love having Cora around the centre and coming to Youthreach in the mornings. If ever your head is 'recked' we can just ask is it ok to take Cora on a walk to make you feel better. Cora is a special dog she loves the attention and fun she gets. She's a good 'Buzz' in the Youthreach. *[] Reilly – Student Cabra Youthreach*



Cavan Student Shines a light on homelessness

Cavan Youthreach learner Jamie Mullarkey shone a new light on the homelessness crisis at a ceremony in Dublin, where he was awarded first prize in the Irish Council for Civil Liberties (ICCL) Youthreach Human Rights Competition, for his uniquely creative lightbox installation entitled 'Have you ever felt invisible before'. The installation — a mixed media piece combining Perspex, wood, photography and lighting — is "designed to encourage the public to consider the invisibility and anonymity of life on the streets for those experiencing homelessness", explained Jamie. At the ceremony, held at the Ombudsman for Children's Office in Dublin on Friday 12th December 2014, Jamie received his prize — a tablet computer courtesy of DID Electrical, as well as a work placement — from RTÉ's Bláthnaid Treacy. ICCL Director Mr Mark Kelly said: "The entries to this year's competition were of an outstanding quality, but Jamie Mullarkey's remarkable work captured the imagination of the judges from the outset. It shines a



light on the spectre of homelessness in a truly haunting way". Cavan Youthreach learner Declan Kelly was also highly commended for his submission, a creative writing piece dealing with the theme of grief and loss. Both leaners put in an outstanding amount of hard work in preparation for the competition in order to develop their initial ideas through to completion. The ICCL/Youthreach Human Rights Competition, run jointly by the Irish Council for Civil Liberties (ICCL) and Youthreach since 2011, encourages young people in Youthreach centres across Ireland to apply their creative talents to explore human rights themes they are passionate about.
