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FOREWORD

Welcome to the Youth Work Plan of Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board, which sets the direction and focus of the ETB in relation to this area of work for the period 2023–2026. Defined as “a planned programme of education designed for the purpose of aiding and enhancing the personal and social development of young people”, youth work is complementary to the formal education of young people.

Through its responsibility for second level education, the ETB engages some 47% of overall post-primary student enrolment in the region.

Support for the educational process that is youth work is a valuable part of the continuum of quality learning opportunities for young people that are at the heart of the work of Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board.



As the state education and training authority for the region, the ETB is fully aware of the importance of education and fully committed to delivering relevant, high quality learning opportunities to all we engage with. Education serves many purposes including, but not limited to:

- » **Preparing young people for citizenship;**
- » **Preparing young people for the world of work;**
- » **Helping young people to shape, in a positive way, open, inclusive, creative and diverse communities.**

Recent years and events – the impacts of COVID and its aftermath; the environmental crisis; war in Europe; economic uncertainty – all pose significant challenges for societies, individuals and institutions. Education, which can be delivered in many different contexts, must be central to meeting and responding to these challenges. Youth work, as recognised in the Value for Money and Policy Review, is a non-formal education intervention with young people that can help enhance seven personal and social development outcomes.

These include:

- » **Communication skills;**
- » **Confidence and agency;**
- » **Planning and problem-solving;**
- » **Relationships;**
- » **Creativity and imagination;**
- » **Resilience and determination;**
- » **Emotional intelligence.**

All of these are crucial skills which will enable people to work together to address the many personal and social challenges that every young person will face. Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board is pleased to take on the challenge of our role to “support the provision, coordination, administration and assessment of youth work services in its functional area”.

The preparation of the Plan involved consultation with a range of partner organisations. We thank especially the members of the Youth Work Committee for their time and commitment to the task of guiding the ETB in relation to youth work services and provision.

The Youth Work Plan 2023–2026 provides a roadmap to guide Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board on that journey.

UNDERSTANDING YOUTH WORK



YOUTH WORK IS FOR ALL YOUNG PEOPLE

“Youth Work” is a term that encapsulates a wide variety of social, cultural, creative, educational or political activities **with, for and by** young people.

It is a form of out-of-school education that focuses on young people aged 10 to 24 years and is regarded as being **non-formal** or **informal** learning. The National Youth Strategy 2015–2020 describes youth work as “a diverse range of activities, topics and measures provided by a range of actors in assorted fields and settings”.

Not *all* work with young people can be defined as Youth Work. In fact, the Youth Work Act 2001 and the Education and Training Board Act 2013 define Youth Work as:

“a planned programme of education designed for the purpose of aiding and enhancing the personal and social development of young people through their voluntary participation, and which (a) is complementary to their formal, academic or vocational education and training, and (b) in Ireland is provided primarily by voluntary Youth Work organisations”.

In practice, Youth Work can be provided on both a **universal** and **targeted** basis.

- » **Universal Youth Work is open to all young people and has an open purpose and curriculum.**
- » **Targeted Youth Work involves tailored interventions with specific groups of young people.**

Quality Youth Work celebrates **diversity** and ensures that young people feel included, welcome, secure and comfortable.

While there is no clear international definition, Youth Work's main characteristics and outcomes are set out by the European Commission in following way:²

DID YOU KNOW?

- » Youth Work takes place in almost every town in Limerick and Clare. It is delivered by a range of bodies, including Youth Work organisations, youth clubs, youth arts groups, drug and alcohol projects, sporting bodies, scouts and girl guide groups.
 - » Most Youth Work is delivered by youth workers who have professional qualifications, skills and expertise in Youth Work principles and best practice. Youth Work is also delivered by volunteers who are supported by Youth Work organisations.
 - » Youth workers engage with young people in a broad age group, usually 10 to 24 years. They build lasting and meaningful relationships throughout their pre-teen, teenage and young adult years.
 - » Youth Work is based on voluntary participation. Young people choose whether, how much and for how long they want to be involved.
 - » Youth Work can be about influencing society, politics and power relations. It works to promote and protect the rights of young people, especially where young people are at a disadvantage, marginalised or socially excluded.
- » Youth Work is primarily funded by the Department of Children, Equality, Diversity, Integration and Youth (DCEDIY).
 - » A recent report³ by Indecon, Ireland's leading independent economic research and consultancy organisation, highlights the economic benefit of investing in young people with a €2.20 return for every €1 invested in Youth Work.
 - » The value of Youth Work is recognised by the Irish Government. Better Outcomes Brighter Futures (Ireland's national policy framework for children and young people) highlights the following:
 - Youth Work is a protective factor that contributes to young people's overall personal and social skills
 - Youth Work supports young people into further education, training, employment and entrepreneurship
 - Young people's relationships with caring youth workers are important for adolescent development
 - » The contribution of Youth Work as non-formal / informal learning needs to be recognised and supported.

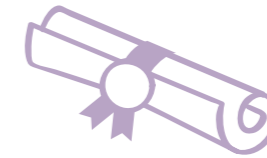

A HUMAN-RIGHTS BASED APPROACH

The ETB's Equality and Human Rights Values Statement commits to promoting equality, prevent discrimination and protect human rights. 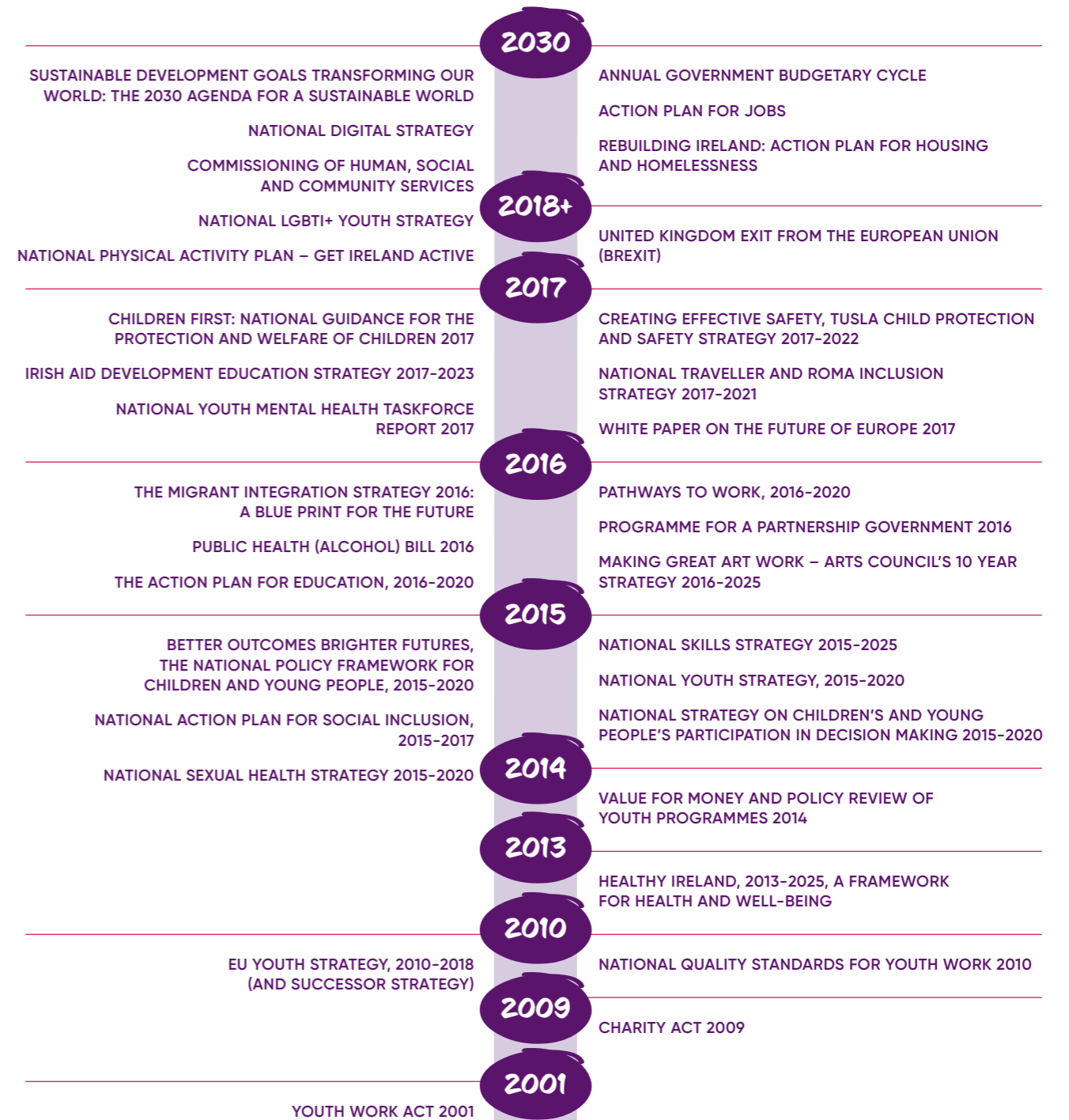
The National Youth Council of Ireland defines Global Youth Work as:

- » Promoting critical thinking skills and empowerment.
- » Facilitating an understanding of the root causes of inequality and acting for a more just and sustainable world.

MEET THE ETB YOUTH WORK TEAM

The ETB Youth Work Team is based in the College of FET O'Connell Avenue Campus in Limerick and the Ennis Campus in Clare.

The team comprises:

- » **Three Youth Officers, one each in County Clare, County Limerick and Limerick City**
- » **A Project Coordinator, working with UBU Your Place Your Space Projects**
- » **A Local Creative Youth Partnership Coordinator, supporting creative programmes based on youth voice**
- » **A Youth Information and Support Officer**

We are supported in our work by the Youth Work Committee. This Committee's role is to make recommendations to the ETB on the performance of its Youth Work functions. The committee is representative of all key stakeholders including Youth Work organisations, Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board members, young people and other statutory bodies.



As a Youth Work team, our main focus is to help to create an environment where young people can access quality Youth Work in Limerick and Clare that is well resourced, safe and fun! We recognise the social value of Youth Work and its contribution to society across a wide range of outcomes".

YOUTH WORK PROVISION IN LIMERICK AND CLARE

A key element of our role is to coordinate the resourcing of Youth Work provision in Limerick and Clare. We do this by securing, administering and reporting on a range of national funding lines, which are set out in the table opposite. In collaboration with local Youth Work organisations, we work to identify gaps in Youth Work provision across the region and to address these gaps in the context of Government policy and funding.

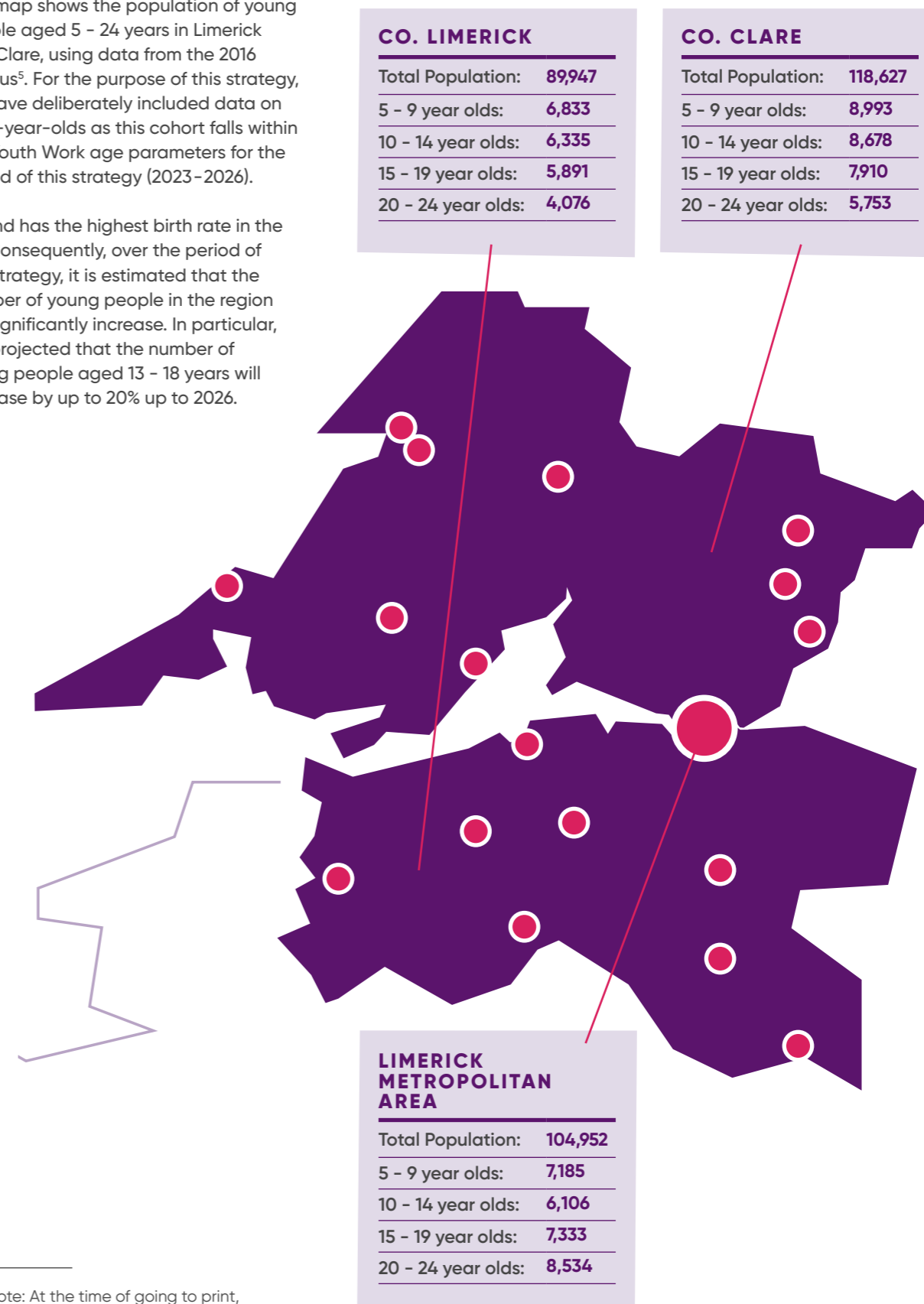
Our role also complements the work of wide range of broader community, voluntary and statutory organisations working with young people in Limerick and Clare. There are a number of overarching structures and plans which facilitate this coordination and collaboration at county and regional level. The key structures and plans in Limerick and Clare are:



YOUNG PEOPLE IN LIMERICK AND CLARE

This map shows the population of young people aged 5 - 24 years in Limerick and Clare, using data from the 2016 Census⁵. For the purpose of this strategy, we have deliberately included data on 5 - 9-year-olds as this cohort falls within the Youth Work age parameters for the period of this strategy (2023-2026).

Ireland has the highest birth rate in the EU. Consequently, over the period of this strategy, it is estimated that the number of young people in the region will significantly increase. In particular, it is projected that the number of young people aged 13 - 18 years will increase by up to 20% up to 2026.

OUR PRINCIPLES

During the consultation process, our stakeholders highlighted the importance of the following principles⁶ to Youth Work policy and practice. These principles will guide our work over the next four years.

- » Young people are **VALUED** in their own right, and recognised as integral to society.
- » Young people are acknowledged as **KEY DRIVERS** in achieving their cognitive, emotional, social, economic and cultural development.
- » Parents, families, other significant adults and communities are recognised as playing a **CRITICAL ROLE** in the development and progression of young people.
- » Professionals and volunteers who work with young people are **RESPECTED**, valued and appropriately supported in their work.
- » Those providing services for young people act in the **BEST INTERESTS** of young people, and respect and uphold young people's rights.
- » An **EQUALITY PERSPECTIVE** is integrated into all policy and practice. Government and other stakeholders work collaboratively, with vertical and horizontal communication and cooperation, to achieve more effective services and supports for young people.
- » Services for young people are open, accessible, resourced and provide **ADDITIONAL SUPPORT** in response to particular needs.
- » Services for young people are **QUALITY ASSURED**, outcomes focused and informed by evidence.

OUTCOMES: WHAT WE HOPE TO ACHIEVE

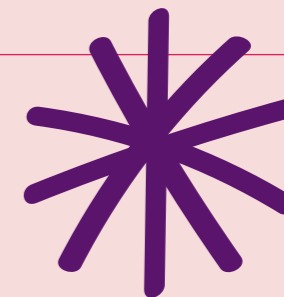

- » There will be a coordinated approach to the resourcing of Youth Work provision in the region.

1. We will provide oversight to ensure that Funded Organisations are operating to best standards in governance.
2. We will promote models and approaches of inclusive Youth Work to reflect the diversity of society.
3. Through our Local Creative Youth Partnership, we will collaborate with Youth Work organisations to provide opportunities for young people to develop their creative lives.
4. We will promote the participation of young people in the design, delivery and evaluation of Youth Work services.
5. We will engage with Youth Work organisations to support their professional learning and development needs.
6. We will share knowledge and collaborate with our ETB colleagues to enhance education and training opportunities for the Youth Work sector.

OUTCOMES

- » Young people will enjoy creativity as part of their lived experience and their rights to access cultural activity will be acknowledged.
- » Young people from minority groups will be engaged in Youth Work.
- » The voice of young people will be heard in decision-making processes.
- » There will be improved links between ETB Youth Work Services and ETB Further Education and Training.
- » Youth Work practitioners will have enhanced knowledge, skills and competencies, leading to improved practice and outcomes for young people.

GOAL 3

Facilitate networking and collaboration between organisations working with young people in the region.

OBJECTIVE 3.1

Create opportunities for Youth Work practitioners to share information and best practice.

OBJECTIVE 3.2

Collaborate with interagency partners to respond to young people's needs in a strategic and integrated way, as set out in Better Outcomes, Brighter Futures.

PRIORITY ACTIONS

1. We will organize networking events to facilitate peer support and sharing of information and good practice at local level.
2. We will enhance our communication with stakeholders using a range of communication mechanisms, including our website, social media, traditional media and newsletters.
3. We will collaborate with local organisations to develop initiatives which meet the emerging needs of young people.
4. We will continue to promote the value of informal learning and creative engagement with our partners.
5. We will work with our partners to develop cultural programmes based on the voice of the young person.
6. We will collaborate with Youth Work organisations to translate the Sustainable Development Goals agenda into meaningful local actions involving young people.
7. We will work with strategic partners to explore the development of Planet Youth in the region, to strengthening evidence-based planning.

OUTCOMES

- » There will be stronger interagency collaboration offering improved opportunities for young people to enhance their personal and social development.
- » There will be closer partnerships with the cultural sector will offering expanded opportunities for young people to explore their creativity.
- » There will be an evidenced-based understanding of the lives and lifestyles of young people in Limerick and Clare.
- » Youth-led actions which contribute to the sustainable development in our planet.

GOAL 4

Promote the value and visibility of Youth Work in the region.

OBJECTIVE 4.1

Promote the role, value and impact of Youth Work as non-formal learning that enhances young people's personal and social development.

OBJECTIVE 4.2

Highlight and advocate for the sustainable resourcing of Youth Work in the region.

PRIORITY ACTION

1. We will capture and showcase best practice in Youth Work provision in the region.
2. We will build the capacity of the Youth Work organisation to showcase the value and impact of Youth Work.
3. We will use local and national structures to promote a better understanding of the value, role and impact of Youth Work and to advocate for enhanced resourcing of the Youth Work sector.

OUTCOMES

- » Youth Work organisations will be able to demonstrate the value of their work better.
- » There will be a better understanding of the role, impact and value of Youth Work in the region.
- » There will be improved resourcing of Youth Work in the region.

MEASURING OUR PROGRESS

We want to be able to monitor and assess our progress towards achieving our goals. Therefore, we will develop an Outcomes Framework to outline how we will work systematically towards achieving sustainable outcomes for young people in the region. This framework will help us to ensure that:

- » our activities are consistent with our vision, mission and values
- » our activities are within the parameters of our strategic goals and objectives
- » we are tracking and evidencing our impact
- » we are continuously adjusting our strategy and activities to respond to internal and external opportunities and challenges.

Our Outcomes Framework will describe the short, medium and long-term impacts we are working to achieve. We will recognise success by achieving these impacts and by ensuring that we are an effective programme working to best practice standards.

IMPLEMENTING OUR STRATEGIC PLAN

This strategy will guide our work over the period 2023–2026 and will help ensure that we fulfill our role effectively and efficiently. The Youth Work Committee will oversee implementation of the strategy and will make recommendations to the ETB in this regard. Each year, we will develop an annual plan which will outline our programme of work and priorities for the year ahead.
